On January 1, 2019, annual membership dues increased by 2%, which was lower than the Consumer Price Index (CPI) of 2.8%. As a non-profit organization, fees are mainly based on cost-recovery, inflation and programming needs for our members. All OACETT fees including those related to membership annual dues, application fees, seminars and PPE/IEPPE and other miscellaneous fees are the same for Canadian and internationally-educated applicants/members. Our fees are reasonable and compare favourably with other regulators and associations.
The Full-time Post-Secondary Student Professional Practice Exam (PPE) Package fees increased by \$5 from \$80 to \$85. This increase was primarily to offset the cost incurred for students who write with the virtual proctor and to cushion against increasing cost due to currency conversion from US dollars to Canadian dollars (Our Canadian vendor was bought by a US-based company.)
OACETT continued to support new Canadians establishing themselves professionally in Canada and applicants applying within one year of arriving in Canada, were eligible to have their application fee waived.

To date there are no reports of negative impact on membership as the increase in membership dues and PPE exam for students are very modest.
