There was a three-week delay in scheduling appointments to write our Professional Practice Exams while our online proctor service adapted to the pandemic.

Extensions were provided to account for the three-week delay.

## d. Fees

i) Describe any improvements/changes implemented in the last year

As a non-profit organization, fees are mainly based on cost-recovery, inflation and programming needs of our members. All OACETT fees including those related to membership annual dues, application fees, seminars and PPE/ and other miscellaneous fees are the same for Canadians and internationallyeducated applicants/members. Our fees are reasonable and compare favourably with other regulators and associations. With consideration for the pandemic's effects on our members, Council passed a motion for no increases to membership dues for 2020.

We removed the Road Construction \$90 application fee for changes in Road Construction designations when moving down a level and replaced it with a \$25 administrative fee, effective April 1, 2020.

We also implemented special COVID-19 response measures including the following:

- Communicated with all members through several platforms advising members to consult with OACETT regarding any difficulty in making their dues payments
- Waived all late payment fees during the pandemic
- Provided installment payment options
- Extended payment due dates until the end of the year before resigning members for non-payment
- Waived reinstatement application fees
- Offered complimentary or heavily discounted online webinars for CPD

The pandemic measures were a relief for many members.

OACETT revised its budget including revenue projections accordingly with our relief measures.

We were able to maintain our timelines except for the three-week delay early on for the Professional Practice Exams and a few other isolated cases due to not being able to go in to the office regularly; approximately 30 to 40 applications were delayed while setting up our out of office processes.

English Language Benchmark exam providers while they switched to online solutions, delayed applicants from submitting results.

Accommodations were provided to give exam extensions and the applications given priority to make up for the delay.

The delay of English Language Benchmark exams impacted very few members as this is only required to be provided prior to certification and not application.
